We have learnt to deal with the technology and that has helped us to be able to maintain our connections. To ensure that the board has been able to meet each month we implemented Zoom as our go to meeting platform, this has

When I accepted this role as president I had one significant goal besides those that already existed in the club and that was for our club to be better known in the community, that Zonta would be a go to organisation.

Because we are not connected to any council area I believe that we miss opportunities to connect. I have watched the work of other clubs where they can make a connection with their council I believe that they are able to make very positive inroads into council based initiatives which can have an impact on women and girls.

As a first step to becoming better known Lindy Berketa, Vice President and I sought out opportunities to work with other organisations and to connect with local government organisations. We have had some success I believe. After a meeting with the Mayor of the City of Charles Sturt we were introduced to the Western Adelaide Violence Against Women Collaborative and are now attending their meetings. We made some very good connections with them and the other members of the collaborative, West Torrens Council, Relationships Australia SA, Zahra as well as Charles Sturt Council this resulted in our Clothes Line Project during the 16 Days of Activism.

We also approached the West Adelaide Football Club, which is where the club meets, to identify how the ZCAF could become involved in assisting in culture change at the club. We were well received by the Chairman of the Board and this resulted in a combined Clothesline Project at that venue. We have recently met with the new CEO and are looking forward at developing further strategies to work together this year.

We also re-registered membership with the National Council of Women–SA which connects us to as many as 23 other women's organisations. I look forward to our connections becoming stronger and stronger. All this has been achieved because the ZCAF members were in agreement that this would be one way we could make a difference.

As can be seen by all of the reports included in this publication we have a very energetic board and membership. There have been a number of members who have been engaged in leadership of some kind in our club this year, please read their reports. Each of them committed themselves to completing the work involved in their portfolio and the result has been exceptional fundraising, a fabulous program of speakers and an equally fabulous birthday celebration, a new approach to advocacy, completion of all of the service projects committed to by the club and a great expansion of our membership numbers. Thank you all for your extraordinary involvement and commitment to the club.

In recent years we were given a significant donation of funds that were to be used for the



work of the club. We are indebted to our benefactor Mr Wes Pickering who made the donation in memory of his late wife Trish, who had been a recipient of one of our breast cushions.

After some deliberation the club has decided to offer an annual award "Woman of Inspiration". The purpose of the Women of Inspiration Award is to recognise women who personify the spirit of the humanitarianism of Zonta. As Western Shelter have adequate stock at this time, and have limited storage, they wish me to hold bags and items on standby until they have used their current stock.

This project ensures that each woman client has her own personal toiletries. The toiletry bags are much valued by staff and clients, particularly those housed in motel units.

My thanks to members and friends who have willingly donated goods or cash towards this project. Special thanks also to the willing assembly/packing team, who have made many, many trips round trestles loaded with goods, Peter and Margaret Rowland, Jessica Knight, Sharon Vale and my husband Jeff.

Members filled 14 gift boxes with small, personal and useful items which were delivered to Aboriginal Support Services, Olga Fudge House, so that every woman client, both in this shelter, and through their outreach program, receives one Christmas gift.

Emergency Relief Grocery/Shopping Vouchers - Stores are chosen based on proximity to clients address

At Western Shelter's request, a greater focus is to allow women clients, unable to access funds or sufficient funds, the dignity of being able to buy essential food, groceries, cleaning products, clothing or shoes for themselves and their children:

Dec 2021: Total of Vouchers \$1000.00

Groceries: Vouchers to a value of \$300.00 from Coles Stores,

Vouchers to a value of \$300.00 from Woolworths Stores. Total \$600.00.

Clothing: Vouchers to a value of \$200.00 from Kmart Stores,

Vouchers to a value of \$200.00 from Big W Stores. Total \$400.00

Food for Thought

Following 4 successful years of implementation, FOOD FOR THOUGHT was funded by the Zonta Club of Adelaide Flinders as one of its service projects in 2021.

The program aimed to empower women who are victims of domestic violence through a series of workshops designed to provide information and support, friendship and confidence through a focus on cooking nutritious food on a budget.

Past evaluations have confirmed that women participating in the programs believe these aims have been met. As in past years, Zonta collaborated with the Zahra Foundation in this project. Due to COVID 19 restrictions and lockdowns, we were unable to begin our project in the beginning of the year.

Our first series of workshops in May were led by Susan MacDonald and these were very well received.



The next program was scheduled for July but was cancelled by Zahra as they did not have the necessary resources to support the program at that time. Happily, we were able to provide some Zonta support to the organization and ran a very successful 3-week program in July led by Lindy Berketa and Lorraine Osmond. Both programs were supported by club members and were received positively by participants

Due to further COVID19 restrictions we were unable to offer more programs, although they were requested by Zahra participants. In 2022 we have changed the model and will be working with clients from "19 on Green", in an effort to further build our relationship with the City of Charles Sturt Council and extend our outreach to a wider range of women.

ZZ Sewing Circle

This is a new project that was established as a result of some of the women whom we spoke with at the Food for Thought project indicating an interest in learning to do some sewing, especially doing repairs and alterations.

When we announced that we were interested in running this program we were offered sewing notions and fabric and also donated 2 sewing machines. We are very grateful to the Janome Sewing Solutions, Seacombe Gardens for the wonderful



donation of the sewing machines. We are also very grateful for the support of our members and friends especially Susan MacDonald who provided a well-resourced sewing box, and Pauline Glover past member and my daughter Lorelei Siegloff for their donations of fabrics.

Isobel McFarlane and I negotiated with Zahra for them to seek out women interested in the first program. Prior to the limitations of movement and getting together placed on us by our state government we were able to run only one program of 3 weeks for 3 hours per week this year.

We ran our first program in the Board room of Zahra and have been able to store our sewing machines, materials and notions in a cupboard at the Zahra offices and are very thankful to Zahra for this.

Isobel and I used this program as a pilot and it has helped us to clarify how we would proceed in the future. We found that the size of the room had limitations especially being too small to be able to fold out fabric and cut out patterns. We also found that we could have had more participants if we had a bigger space and more machines.

We attempted to run a program in February however because of the irregularity of school attendances the pandemic which impacted on mothers we decided to run the next one later in the year.

As a result of what we learnt from the first program we will now be running the Sewing Circle at 19 on Green which has rooms that are bigger than what we had in the Board room at Zahra. They have also offered us the use of another 4 machines so we now have a total of 8 machines available for our next Sewing Circle program which we are commencing on 12th May.

We are looking forward to welcoming other club members to help on the team this year.

District 23 Project – Breast Care Cushions

The Zonta Breast Cushion Project provides vital support for women after breast cancer surgery, by the provision of a free breast cushion. The U-shaped satin pillow is worn under the arm with strap over the shoulder, giving physical & emotional comfort whilst sleeping, driving or other daily activities. It enables women to get back some kind of normality a little quicker, and shows we care.

Breast cushions were first produced by the Zonta Club of Botany Bay in the late 1990s. Our club was instrumental in bringing the project to S.A in 2000, and also to District 23 as an ongoing District 23 project (by past District 23 Breast Cushion Project coordinators Pauline Glover & myself). Our club continues to be actively involved by providing direct to our allocated Hospitals- Calvary North Adelaide, Western Community, QEH, Mt Gambier, Cancer Council's Kent Town & Greenhill Lodge, and on individual request. The cushion is actively promoted by the Breast Cancer Network Australia in their "My Journey" booklet, McGrath Foundation & by other breast care nurses.

Some filling is donated by S.A company Air Diffusion Agencies in 10kg bales, reducing costs tremendously. Some filling is from new pillows from Kmart. Material is purchased on sale at Spotlight. Our cushions are wrapped in bright cellophane & ribbons with information insert. Cushions are then delivered by myself in bulk (10-25 at a time) to hospitals so they are always available. Mt Gambier supply is usually posted.



Most of our cushions are produced by the Silks craft group (15-20 every 6-8 weeks) (picture to the right is of Lindsey a solo sewer extraordinaire and organiser of "Silks), or by members in their own time. A special thanks to all sewers. The annual Walford workshop each December fell victim to COVID restrictions in 2020, but returned in 2021- a great service & education morning for students. I buy then cut all materials to a standard pattern, and provide the cut outs & filling on demand to all sewing helpers. Plans are for another member workshop in 2022. Our project is funded by club fundraising & individual donations from recipients.

My report covers 1/1/21 to 31/12/21 (as this is the reporting cycle to the District 23 coordinator.

<u>COSTS for 2021 = \$ 1024-40</u> This includes material \$429, filling \$218, \$158 cello/ribbon, post \$125, cottons/elastics/ pins \$92. Over \$340 was saved by purchasing materials at reduced prices.

<u>DONATED in 2021 = 317 cushions.</u> (Western Community 67, Calvary 144, QEH 43, Mt Gambier 34, personal 1, Cancer Council 28)

TOTAL DONATED by Adelaide Flinders SINCE 2000= 5,801.

This is 5,801 women helped by our club! Well done!!

International District Project – Birthing Kits

Since its inception the Birthing Kit Foundation has distributed over 2.4 million kits in more than 30 countries through partner organisations. It has trained more than 10 000 traditional birth attendants and contributed to the prevention of FGM in communities.

It was great to be able to hold our regular birthing kit assembly day at Walford (cancelled last year because of COVID 19). The kits were assembled by 60 Year 11 girls and staff as part of their Community Service Week activities.



There was a hive of activity as the enthusiastic girls assembled the kits from scratch, folding plastic sheets and inserting them in bags, cutting string and then assembling all the components (gloves, soap, gauze, string and scalpel) before packing the completed kits in boxes of 100.

It was a magnificent effort to assemble in record time 600 kits (funded by club service funds plus a donation from Walford). The kits have been distributed in shipments to field partners in Uganda and Papua New Guinea.

Thank you to the Year 11 students and a special thank you to club members who supported the workshop.

Young Women in Public Affairs

The Young Women in Public Affairs Awards program, established in 1990 by Past International President Leneen Forde, recognises young women aged 16-19 years for their demonstrated leadership skills, their commitment to volunteerism and their support of Zonta International's mission of empowering women worldwide through service and advocacy. It encourages them to continue their participation in public and political life.

Since the program's inception, Zonta International has given 1013 awards (includes District and International awards) totalling US\$1 207 250 to 851 young women from 58 countries.

The recipient of our Adelaide Flinders 2021 Award was Scarlett Partridge Powell, a student at Flinders University, formerly of Blackwood High School. Her submission was forwarded to District 23 for consideration for District and International awards. Scarlett was presented with her Adelaide Flinders YWPA Certificate and prize money at the Mid-Biennium Dinner in May. As Scarlett shared a brief glimpse into her life and activities, those present were impressed by her enthusiasm, her goals and her commitment to service and empowering women, especially young women.

Once again the Adelaide White Ribbon Breakfast face-to-face had to be cancelled but was held virtually via Zoom with a fabulous line-up of



a great Zontian, among them was the Zonta Club of Adelaide Torrens; I was fortunate to be at their 40th birthday party in October.

A great deal has changed in Zonta in Australia since we were chartered. At the time we were part of District 16, which covered Australia and New Zealand. The District was later split into two at the Auckland conference in 1989. New Zealand remained as District 16. Australia then became District 23 and later separating into Districts 22, 23 and 24. Our club is in District 23 which traverses WA, SA, NT, Vic and Tasmania, we are one of 12 clubs in Area 2 which covers South Australia and Northern Territory, and unfortunately NT no longer has a club.

Our Charter was presented by Mrs. Leneen Ford, who was at that time the District 16 Governor, at the then

newly-opened Hilton Hotel in Adelaide on 26th November 1982. The club had 35 Charter members. The Charter President was Esme Proudman, She is with us today, welcome Esme (pictured right). The rest of the executive included Vice President Paddi Lowry, Second Vice Chairman Trudi Pohl, Treasurer Liz Versteeg and Secretary Barbara Gepp. Today I am pleased to say our membership is a healthy 28 (of course there is always room for more members who could join us in our various Service, Advocacy and Fundraising endeavours). While there will always be resignations each year, for one reason or another, it is wonderful to know that the new member numbers currently far outnumber the resignations. Since our mid biennium dinner in May we have inducted and welcomed 8 new and energetic women to our club.



Today only five members are not able to be at this celebration, all of whom have apologised because of family obligations which is really appropriate. I want to thank all of the members for their commitment to the work of the Zonta Club of Adelaide Flinders each member brings special skills which make it possible to have a diversity of initiatives occurring in this club at any one time. - a place for multicultural community and school education programs, not-for-profits and service provider events
- a place for Indigenous and other community gatherings, public events, others vigils and marches
- a place to start a public discourse on domestic and family violence.

<u>The community is inclusive of</u>: Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander, LGBTQI, and culturally and linguistically diverse migrant and refugee communities. The Zonta Club of Adelaide Flinders was ably represented on the committee responsible for the event to launch the Place of Courage in Apex Park St Claire by Heather Smigiel.

Financial Report 2021-2022

Treasurer's Report

I am pleased to present the unaudited Financial Statement for the 12 month period 1st April 2021 to 31st March 2022.

Whilst COVID is still out in the community we have been able to meet face to face for most of the year and this has had a positive impact both for the Club and Service Accounts.

Club Account

It is pleasing to note that the total cost of printing the Recipe Books has now been fully reimbursed to the Club Account. All proceeds from sales from now on will be credited to the Service Account. Whilst it appears that the Club has made a profit of \$1,700 this year, it should be noted that this has only been possible because of the following, and not by dues payments alone.

- Purse money is imperative to cover the cost of guest speakers.
- We made a profit on our 40th birthday, due to the committee's due diligence and the fact that it was very well supported by all members.
- We held a raffle at our Handover Dinner which monies covered the cost of the change in venue.
- We did not have to pay for website and internet costs this year as they are paid bi-annually.
- And we have not had to pay for delegate registrations to either District Conferences or International conventions for the past 2 years.

Service Account

We have been very successful with fundraising this year, and even though venue numbers were decreased by Government to cope with COVID19 we were still able to hold our Movie Night and fundraising events. Service Funds were bolstered by proceeds from our 40th birthday event with both a raffle and wine wall. We were also fortunate to receive the proceeds from the Zahra luncheon Auction, and while we received a lesser amount this year from our Entertainment book sales, we look forward to the time when we are all out having fun, dining socially and Entertainment books are back in use.

We have again been fortunate to receive donations for our service projects. It must be stated that these donations are in no small way, because of our members advocating the virtues of our service projects, and I would like to thank you all. Of course one large \$2500 donation from Wes Pickering, in memory of his wife Trish Pickering, has made it possible for us to initiate the new "Woman of Inspiration Award".

This year club treasurers were responsible for updating all membership details on- line with regards to renewing members, new members, transfers, and resignations and make payments to Zonta International directly and this has certainly streamlined the process.

As reported last year overseas payments and internet payments usually come with a fee attached. I would like to remind members that fees need to be budgeted for when running any event.

It is pleasing to note that while we have again been under restrictions due to COVID 19 this past year we have still been able to run a vibrant club and with the assistance of all members, families and friends, we have been able to maintain a very positive financial position which will aid both our Club and Service projects in the coming year.

Archives Report - 2021- 2022

The archives and history of our club are well recorded. Minutes of all board meetings, dinner meetings and annual general meetings are kept together with annual reports and monthly newsletters. All these documents are now kept electronically. Our Club Newsletter and Annual Report document our service projects and fundraisers with relevant photos when they have been taken. The club records retained date back to our Charter and are now kept at the home of Carolyn Colquhoun.

In December 2021 our Club celebrated its 40th Birthday. A PowerPoint presentation was produced by Eronwy Edwards. This presentation showed where we have come as a Club and where we are now. Records of all the above files for the first 20 years at least were printed on old Gestetner and copy machines and were bound and are kept in large plastic containers, however files for the last 20 years are now kept electronically on one mini USB stick.

The 65th Zonta International convention this year 2022 will be held in Hamburg Germany. As this report is for the Archives I believe it should be mentioned that COVID19, especially new strains are still very much with us. Also with the Russian invasion of Ukraine now taking place, our members have cancelled their plans to travel to Hamburg for the convention this year.

The 66th Zonta International Convention in 2024 will be held in Brisbane, Australia so hopefully we can look forward with D23 to welcoming many Zontians down under.

Our "Club History in Brief" is included below in this annual report.

A Brief History of Zonta Club Adelaide Flinders 1981 - 2022

The Zonta Club of Adelaide Flinders was chartered on 2 December 1981, with the support of the late Dr Heide Taylor from the Zonta Club of Adelaide. In December 2021 we celebrated our 40th birthday at a luncheon which celebrated the many years of service given to the community by the club. It was wonderful to see many past members including our past honorary member Ms Liz Scare and her husband as well as out Charter President Esme Proudman. Esme and the current president Lesley Siegloff join hands over a large knife to cut the cake.

At that time we were part of District 16, which covered all of Australia and New Zealand. The District was split into two at the Auckland Conference in 1989 with New Zealand remaining as District 16. Australia then became District 23 – later separating into Districts 22, 23 and 24.

Within our District, which covers WA, SA, NT, Vic, Tas, we are one of 12 clubs in Area 2, which covers South Australia and Northern Territory.

Our Charter was presented by Mrs Leneen Ford who was at that time the District 16 Governor, at the newly-opened Hilton Hotel in Adelaide on 26th November 1982. The club had 35 Charter members. Charter President: Esme Proudman, First Vice President: Paddi Lowry, Second Vice Chairman: Trudy Pohl, Treasurer: Liz Versteeg, and Secretary: Barbara Gepp.

Meetings: Held on the 3rd Wednesday of each month. Meetings began at The Public Schools Club, and then moved to Ayers House for over 20 years, and then in 2010 we moved back to our original home, the Public Schools Club. In 2019 we moved to our current location of the West Adelaide Football Club. This year there were a number of constraints to holding face to face meetings especially Board meetings so Board meetings were generally held via Zoom. Unfortunately because of restrictions placed on us by government related to the Covid 19 pandemic we were unable to run our Amelia Earhart fundraising meeting in January, as a result the club decided to make a donation to the Foundation.

Club Board and Committees: For most of its history the Club Board has comprised: President, Vice President, Treasurer, Secretary and four or five Directors. Whilst it is preferable for Directors to chair a committee, this is not always possible.

Past Presidents: Charter President Esme Proudman (1981-1984), Jill Welsh (1984-1986), Gwenda Cunningham (1986-1988), Elizabeth Smith (deceased) (1988-1990), Shirley Stagg (1990-1992), Dr Sarah Cunningham (1992-1994), Marjorie Smith (deceased) OAM (1994-1996), Patricia Russell (deceased) (1996-1998), Fay Leditschke (1998-2000), Heather Sutton (2000-2002), Dr Pauline Glover (2002-2004), Isobel McFarlane (2004-2006) Cintra Amos (2006-2008), Carolyn Colquhoun (2008-2010), Jodi Knoop (2010-2012), Anne Miller (2012-2014), Sue Lear (2014-2016), Eronwy Edwards (2016-2018), Dr Heather Smigiel (2018-2020) and Dr Lesley Siegloff (2020-2022).

Our Club has had two Honorary Members – Jennifer Cashmore MP and Ms Liz Scarce, wife of former SA Governor, Rear Admiral Mr Kevin Scarce.

Membership: Membership peaked at 48 in 1991 and fell as low as 18 in 2001. Numbers remain steady between 20 and 30 for some years; however we are now 30 members. Length of service is valued and rewarded with Club service badges being given for every 5 years of service. We are fortunate to have a wealth of knowledge within our club with half of the membership having over 20 years, service and no less than 10 Past Presidents among our membership.

Fellowship is encouraged and is an integral part of our Club and members are congratulated for special occasions and supported whenever the need arises.

Advocacy Projects: Advocacy is an increasing priority for Zonta and we are active within our Combined Area Advocacy Committee. We support ACSO (Assoc. of Community Service Organisations SA) and are an active member of The National Council of Women - SA. A member of our club has been on the Adelaide White Ribbon Breakfast Committee since inception in 2008 and is now a member of the new White Ribbon Australia SA Committee. This year we became more engaged with our local Western Community joining the West Adelaide Domestic Violence Consortium which has representation from the West Torrens Council, Charles Sturt Council and the Port Adelaide, Enfield Council and organisations such as, Uniting care, Relationships Australia –SA and Zahra.

Service Projects: Service projects have addressed the Zonta priorities of health, education and economic self- sufficiency of women and girls.

In 2022 we strongly support the "Zonta Says No!" Campaign to "Stop Violence against Women". We currently support women's shelters with toiletry bags, and our Shoe Boxes of Love project. In the past we have supported a girls' vocational orphanage and learning centre in Cambodia, indigenous and migrant projects, scholarships for young women undertaking study or internships, and also the

production of a video to provide information and treatment options to women diagnosed with breast cancer, which was translated into several languages, We have recently partnered with the Girl Guides Association and the Zahra Foundation to offer programs to support women and girls. Our club was one of only 2 within our district to win a grant from Zonta International to support a project whereby we partnered with another organisation, this was the beginning of our association with the Zahra Foundation, and the "Food for Thought" project began. The Zonta Rug Project which began in 2005 was a very successful hands-on project involving not only Zontians but the wider community and while this project is no longer a club project, many club members still participate and offer their service. We are active with all grant applications when they are offered and we have been successful on occasions. In recent years we have also been fortunate to receive two very generous donations from Mr. Wes Pickering in memory of his late wife Trish who died 10 years ago from Breast Cancer. Having received a Breast cushion just following her original surgery both Trish and Wes were very grateful and became interested in Zonta's work and philosophy. The funds donated will be used over the next few years to award 2 women per annum who have been an inspiration in supporting their community.

Fundraising Activities: The Club's major fundraiser, an annual movie night has been held for over 30 years. Other successful fundraisers include "A Taste of Zonta" recipe book which included contributions from members and celebrities. Over the years, we have held numerous social fundraising dinners, lunches, fashion parades, art exhibitions, and high teas to name a few. In recent times a regular sausage sizzle has been added to our fundraising activities and something new, a garage sale. Members are continually thinking of ways in which to boost funds, both for Club and Service use. The Zonta Challenge and loose change purses to name two. An outcome of one of our successful service projects which was funded through the ZI Centenary Grants "Food for Thought" was the production of a special recipe book. The books 2nd edition has been offered for sales at many events, the funds raised since printing costs have been recovered are included in our fundraising outcomes.

Area Activities: The Club has been represented at all Area Workshops since Charter and hosted many of these, and club members have served terms as Area 2 Director. The club will host the Area 2 Workshop in May this year as we see out this biennium.

District Involvement: The Club has always been well represented at District Conferences and has been represented on the District 23 Board with Margaret Rowland serving as Governor, Lt Governor and Area Director 1994-2000. Cintra Amos served as Area 2 Director and Lt. Governor 2008-2012. Carolyn Colquhoun served as D23 Treasurer 2010-2012. Cintra Amos was the chair of the 2015 District 23 Conference Committee. and was District Service Chair (2016-2018). Sue Lear was District Chair of Young Women in Public Affairs (2016-18), and Margaret Rowland was appointed Chair of the District 23 Centenary Anniversary Celebration Committee (2018-2020). Past President Eronwy Edwards served on the District Board as Area 2 Director (2018-2020).

<u>Past members</u>: Dr Pauline Glover served as Area 2 Director and Lt Governor 2004-2008 and chaired the District Advocacy Committee 2010-2014, and Anne Miller served as Vice Area 2 Director (2014-2016).

District Projects: The Club has strongly supported all District 23 projects including Breast Cushions which are made and offered to all women in hospitals undergoing breast surgery, and Birthing Kits

which are packed and sent to third world countries so that women can have clean birthing conditions.

International Activities: The Club has been represented at most International Conventions since Charter, with no less than 7 club members attending the Japan Convention in June 2018. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic and the airlines being grounded, the Zonta International Convention in 2020 which was to be held in Chicago, was cancelled. This year 2022 the convention is to be held in Hamburg, Germany, however due to Russia invading Ukraine our members cancelled their plans to travel to Europe. In 2024 Brisbane, Australia is to host the Convention and we look forward with D23 to welcoming Zontians down under.

Zonta International Foundation for Women: Each year the Club contributes 1/3 of funds raised to the Zonta International Foundation. Some members make individual donations, and the Club makes donations in the name of members on special occasions.
