This year the position of President was expanded to encompass the concept of Co-Presidents with the election of the two of us – Lindy Berketa and Lorraine Omond. We report to you, our Members of Zonta Adelaide Flinders Inc., on how we have managed for the past year, two working as one!

The success of this venture will be measured at the end of the biennium.

Before we accepted the Nominating Committee's recommendation, we had a number of in-depth conversations as to how we could make this work. Primarily, we looked at our individual strengths, areas we would want to support, how we could establish the best working environment, and what we could bring to the Club by taking on this role. We established that our focus for the first year would be Fellowship, followed by Advocacy and Service and to be a cohesive caring group that provided for Women and Girls as well as the individual member themselves.



Respect for each other was top of the list. We had the benefit of working together, both within Zonta projects and with outside agencies in the past. We knew each other well. We agreed that it was imperative to always keep each other in the loop on all matters at all times with communication being a

non- negotiable prerequisite. No decision is taken alone – thank goodness for the great digital age!

There was a depth of experience that was available to us. When looking at the proposed set up of the new Board we had a Current Area 2 Director who was immediate past President, a past Area 2 Director and past President, a past President, and between us we had held the positions of Vice President, Treasurer and Secretary. Added to this was the fantastic history this Club has with current members having held positions within ZCAF and ZI.

There was a fantastic mix on the Board of steady experienced Zontians and also refreshingly innovative new members. We take this opportunity to thank them all for their generous contributions to date.

This year, our elected Treasurer re-located to Canada with family and the position was filled by Lindy Berketa in the interim. Our Secretary, Melanie Roberts, was unable to continue, and Board Member Julie Hayford stepped up to take on the role. We are extremely fortunate to have her wonderfully efficient and reliable skills as Secretary.

During the past year, many meetings and functions have been held. Full details have been set out in the reports that follow from the leads of the various Committees.

Our inaugural Award Night for The Woman of Inspiration Award in honour of Trish Pickering was held one year ago at our Handover Meeting in 2022. Two very worthy recipients, Bec and Bianca, were presented with their certificates, badges and \$1000 by Jill Welsh, Lindy Berketa and Lesley Siegloff. This year, with many thanks to our most generous benefactor, Mr Wes Pickering, we will have three recipients of this annual award to be announced at our Mid Biennium Dinner. We are indeed happy to have Wes attending our Dinner to make the presentations in person.

For our International Night we chose to celebrate Sri Lanka. We hosted the Hon Consul for Sri Lanka and his wife, together with a guest speaker, his wife and mother. WAFC catered for the evening with some mouth-watering authentic Sri Lankan dishes. Our Christmas Dinner was held at the Caledonian Hotel North Adelaide, recommended by one of our members. It was a wonderful evening of fellowship to commence the festive season.



Our extremely well attended Film Night held in October was again a fantastic success. This year we had the most generous support of a number of sponsors, an initiative suggested by our Fundraising Chair, Sarah Taylor. These included Harcourts Packenham Glenelg, Smile Co Norwood, Sarah Taylor Interiors and Village Baker. Their most generous support has placed the Club in a tremendous position to actively search for new Service Programmes in the coming year.

The Club has also donated to the Ukrainian Appeal, to support those families coming to Adelaide in the face of hostilities in their homeland. A donation has also been made to the Amelia Earhart Foundation. It is the 85th year of this Foundation. Many Clubs celebrated this event in January 2023 and some of our members joined in their celebrations. Our own Amelia Earhart celebration dinner in January was requested by Members to fill a gap in the ZI calendar. There were many paper planes flying around the Club Rooms that night.

Collaboration with other Area 2 Clubs has been in focus, and we have had the benefit of attending Presidents' Area 2 Meetings via Zoom and sharing of ideas and information.

Our Board adopted a new process of reporting at Dinner meetings, a Consent Agenda. Reports are sent out with the Agenda, and having been read by members, and when no discussion is required, are adopted as one. This allows us time at dinner meetings to share a meal with our fellow members in an unhurried manner. Time management is the key.

Board and Club Members have spent time revisiting our goals and how they align with Zonta International strategies and goals, which was great preparation for setting up our Service and Advocacy Projects for the coming year. We thank all who enthusiastically contributed to our February meeting with many suggestions for expanding existing projects of Breast Cushions, Birthing Kits, Vouchers etc. and the projects running in conjunction with Zahra Foundation together with several exciting new ideas which are being researched. Due to some incredible past fundraising and sponsorship, we now have the ability to look at new projects when a need is established. This really assists in working towards 'Building a Better World for Women and Girls'.

Another highlight of the year was International Women's Day in March. With many celebrations being held, Lorraine and a group from our Club, attended the UN breakfast at the Convention Centre, attended by 2,800 – setting an Australian record.



Carolyn Kennedy was an amazing speaker, showing us another side of her familial dynasty. Lindy attended the Afternoon Tea at the Town Hall where the speaker, Kate Hannaford delivered a very interesting keynote address on Ageing and associated discrimination. Our March Club meeting was resplendent with rose table decorations (thanks to Susan MacDonald,) for a celebratory dinner and a video of an address by our President, Ute Scholz on Child Marriage in India.

As we begin the second year of our Biennium, we look back over the past year and have to count ourselves so lucky to have the fantastic support of our Board. A special thanks to our Vice President, Eronwy Edwards (who is also our PR/Communications Lead) for her support, especially in all matters IT.

Club Member Lesley Siegloff is the current District 23 Area 2 Director, and in this capacity she has helped us keep abreast of current District and International priorities,

while Eronwy as ZI District 23 Area 2 Foundation Ambassador has kept our minds on the importance of the 4 International Service Projects, and the International Scholarships and how our contribution of 1/3 of our fundraising profits make a difference to the lives of women and girls internationally

Service Projects Report

The leads of these projects are committed and hard-working and have achieved much for women locally and overseas (in the case of the Birthing Kit Project).

It is pleasing to note that in 2023 Adelaide Flinders has maintained a strong focus on Service (thankyou to Lindy and Lorraine) with lots of work going on behind the scenes and one meeting devoted to discussion of new possibilities. I am hopeful for the future.

In the future we will need to consider how our projects might enable those we work with, what this might look like and the project designs that might truly contribute to improving the lives of women and girls.

Food for Thought

Unfortunately, after a successful 4 years it was not possible to run the Food For Thought program in 2022. Both Zahra and 19 on Green who had been fantastic partners in previous years, changed managers. I met personally with four new and Acting managers at 19 on Green but could not get enough interest from possible participants to run the program.

However, this year Lindy Berketa has been meeting and negotiating with the new manager at the Zahra Foundation and there is hope that we may be able to work together again.

Western Services Support Project

Toiletry Bag Project

The toiletry bags are made using rubber-backed curtain fabric, corded, and filled with basic and essential toiletries. Many members, and some work colleagues of members, have donated toiletries to help reduce the cost of this project.



Women's Safety Services Western Shelter

In August 2022 the 50 filled toiletry bags which had been held in stock for WSS Western Shelter were delivered.

In January this year, 30 filled toiletry bags were also delivered. Uniting Communities

Re-Homing Program

On 13 October 2022, 10 filled toiletry bags were delivered to Uniting Communities Re-Homing Program for Aboriginal women.

Aboriginal family Services Olga Fudge House

Olga Fudge House at Westbourne Park had adequate filled toiletry bags at this time but will call when their stock is low. 10 packs to be delivered on 21 March 2023.

This project ensures that each woman client has her own personal toiletries.

The toiletry bags are much valued by staff and clients, particularly those housed in motel units.

My thanks to members and friends who have willingly donated goods or cash towards this project. Special thanks also to the willing assembly/packing team, who have made many, many trips round trestles loaded with goods. Club members have approved that this project will continue.

Shoeboxes of Love

Members filled 23 gift boxes with small, personal and useful items which were delivered to Aboriginal Support Services, Olga Fudge House, and also to Uniting Communities Aboriginal women, so that every woman client, both in these shelters, and through their outreach program, receives one Christmas gift.

Thanks to everyone for your great commitment. This project has been approved to continue.

Emergency Relief Shopping Vouchers

(Stores are chosen on proximity to clients' addresses)

At Western Shelter's request, a greater focus is to allow women clients, unable to access funds or sufficient funds, and the dignity of being able to buy essential clothing or shoes for themselves and their children:

10 vouchers of \$50 each to a value of \$500.00 from Kmart Stores,10 vouchers of \$50 each to a value of \$500.00 from Big W Stores. Total of Vouchers \$1000.00. This project has been approved by members to continue.

In summing up, Members of the Zonta Club of Adelaide Flinders have made a huge difference to women living in difficult circumstances. Thank you.

Sewing Circle

'Building resilience of women through sewing and engagement.'

2022 was the second year that the club supported a special sewing circle for women who have support needs after experiencing domestic violence. The first program was run in 2021 using the board room of the Zahra Foundation. In 2022 we used '19 on Green' in Brompton which give us access to space to spread out.

My original idea for this project occurred at the time of our pilot project with Zahra 'Cooking on a Budget'. While working with the women involved, I had a number of discussions with some of the women and asked them if there were other skills that they thought they would like to have that would assist them given their financial limitations. The women were interested in gaining some sewing skills which could help with making alterations to clothes that they purchased from Op shops, making special things for their children including helping them with projects such as designing a costume for their children to wear at Book Week.

The aims of the project.

- To enable women who have suffered from domestic violence and women in need women to build capacity and extend their resilience.
- To expand the knowledge and skills of women to include sewing skills, both machine and hand sewing.
- To enable women who are receiving services through Zahra to engage with one another around a common need.

Some of the unexpected outcomes of the 'Cooking on a Budget' project were that the women participants were able to build relationships of support with one another. This has become evident also with the members of the sew circle both in 2021 and 2022. The women have taken time to talk to each other and have also expressed their appreciation of learning from members of ZCAF and having the opportunity to meet and talk to people they may not otherwise have met.

There are a number of activities that could be undertaken in this project. The women each make their own decision about what they want to learn or do if they already have skills but no resources. We started off by making shopping bags which the women were delighted to take home to show their children.

My thanks go to Isobel McFarlane, Marcia Hakendorf and Lorraine Omond for their assistance with the project.

District 23 Projects – Breast Care Cushions



The Zonta Breast Cushion Project provides vital support for women after breast cancer surgery, by the provision of a free breast cushion. The U-shaped satin pillow is worn under the arm with strap over the shoulder, giving physical & emotional comfort whilst sleeping, driving or other daily activities. It enables women to get back some kind of normality a little quicker, and shows we care!

Breast cushions were first produced by the Zonta

Club of Botany Bay in the late 1990s. Our club was instrumental in bringing the project to S.A in 2000, and also to District 23 as an ongoing District 23 project (by past District 23 Breast Cushion Project coordinators Pauline Glover then myself). Our club continues to be actively involved by making & supplying direct to our allocated Hospitals- Calvary North Adelaide, Western Community, QEH, Mt Gambier, Cancer Council, and on individual request. And from2022 also Naracoorte Hospital. The project is actively promoted by the Breast Cancer Network Australia in their "My Journey" booklet, McGrath Foundation & by other breast care nurses.

Most filling in the last year was purchased- as new pillows from Kmart (good quality, cheaper than buying filling packs). Hopefully, past suppliers will again supply us free in the future. Material is purchased on sale at Spotlight- still the cheapest option.

Our cushions are wrapped in bright cellophane & ribbons with an information insert. This wrapping has just doubled in price. Insert printing is still donated free.

Cushions are delivered by me in bulk (10-25 at a time) to hospitals, so they are always available. Mt Gambier & Naracoorte supply is posted.

The Silks craft group stopped making cushions for us in 2022, so members (Kae, Bernadette, Sue Lear and I) made most of our stock in our own time. The annual



December workshop at Walford also saw another 100 completed- a great service & education morning for students and Adelaide Flinders members.

I buy and cut all materials to a standard pattern, and provide the cut outs and filling on demand to all sewing helpers- so consider coming on board to sew with friends!

Our project is funded by club fundraising and individual donations from recipients.

My report covers 1/1/22 to 31/12/22 (the reporting cycle to the District 23 coordinator)

COSTS for 2022 = \$ 1426-19 -This includes material \$577, filling \$415, \$254 cello/ribbon, post \$171, cottons/elastics/ pins \$8. Over \$350 was saved by purchasing materials at reduced prices. Costs rose by 40% from 2021, but we have materials in stock for 2023.

Donated in 2022 = 294 cushions. (Western Community 60, Calvary 132 QEH 24, Mt Gambier 61, personal 2, Naracoorte 15)

TOTAL DONATED by Adelaide Flinders SINCE 2000 = 6095 women *helped by our club! Well done!*

District 23 Project – Birthing Kits

Since its inception the Birthing Kit Foundation has distributed over 2.6 million kits in remote areas of more than 30 countries through partner organisations. More than 10,000 traditional birth attendants have been trained.



Adelaide Flinders members held our regular assembly day with Year 11 students at Walford Anglican School as part of their Community Service week activities. 50 students and staff assembled 400 kits in a hive of activity ably guided and assisted by a group of Adelaide Flinders members.

The kits which were funded by club service funds and a generous donation from Walford have now

been included in a shipment to partner organisations in Nigeria, Uganda, and DR Congo

Thank you to the Walford students and staff and a special thank you to the club members who supported the assembly day.

Awards

The Young Women in Public Affairs Award Program (YWPA) established in 1990 by Past International President Leneen Forde recognises young women aged 16-19 years for their demonstrated leadership skills, their commitment to volunteerism and support of Zonta's mission. It encourages their continued participation in public life.


On completion of an application form by candidates and assessment of submissions by individual Zonta clubs, each Zonta district selects a winning candidate whose entry is submitted to Zonta International. Up to 37 International YWPA awards of US\$5,000 each are awarded annually to a very worthy young woman.

Since the program's inception Zonta International has given 1054 awards worth US\$1,303,750 to 882 young women from 60 countries,

Unfortunately, Adelaide Flinders did not receive any submissions for the award this year, hopefully we will revive interest for the coming year.

Women who have conquered adversity and as a result of their service are supportive of other and the community is a better place to live.

On that night the club had the pleasure to present two awards to two very inspiring women – As a way of advertising this award the club has produced a logo which has been used on both a banner which announces the award as well as card also advertising the award.

The card was placed on the tables and attendees were encouraged to take a card with them so that they could advertise the award for next year. As well as the logo the banner also includes a lovely picture of a butterfly which was painted by the late Trish Pickering. The logo was designed by my daughter Lorelei Siegloff. After I explained to her about the philosophy of the award likening the women to a phoenix she produced this lovely design

using the Zonta colour palette. Unfortunately Lorelei was not able to be at the award

ceremony on the night but had been delighted to have made the contribution to the club's special award. The award committee for 2022 included Vice President Lindy Berketa, Jill Welsh and myself. The award was presented on the night by Jill Welsh the longest serving member of the club.



The award went to two outstanding and resilient women mentors on this occasion; Bec Owen captain of the Western Adelaide Women's Football Team and Bianca an amazing woman who, after a very complex and difficult life which included being on the receiving end of domestic violence, today works to support vulnerable women. These two women received a special certificate, financial reward and a badge. I would like



to give a special thank you to our benefactor Wes Pickering without whom we would not have been able to make this award. Wes has promised to donate to this special event for years to come and the club is now able to consider giving the award to at least 2 women per year. Thank you Wes, you too are "helping to build a better world for women and girls".

During the past 12 months the club has maintained its presence in a conscious manner through the use of a range of print and social media within and beyond the club.



Photos from club meetings, member inductions and guest speakers were shared promptly on the club Facebook Page, where they attracted positive responses. Cintra Amos ensured that a steady

flow of posts related to wider Zonta and Advocacy topics. Cintra also ensured that members and our wider list of Friends of Zonta were informed of upcoming events and special days.

Our Facebook page has 718 followers, and according to the site, this is on par with similar organisations. 97% of followers are women, 3%

Archives Report – 2022-2023

The archives and history of our club are well recorded. Minutes of all board meetings, dinner meetings and annual general meetings are kept together with annual reports and monthly newsletters. All these documents are now kept electronically. Our Club Newsletter and Annual Report document our service projects and fundraisers with relevant photos when they have been taken. The club records retained date back to our Charter and are now kept at the home of Carolyn Colquhoun.

In December 2021 our Club celebrated its 40th Birthday. A PowerPoint presentation was produced by Eronwy Edwards. This presentation showed where we have come as a Club and where we are now. Records of all the above files for the first 20 years at least were printed on old Gestetner and copy machines and were bound and are kept in large plastic containers, however files for the last 20 years are now kept electronically on one mini-USB stick.

The 65th Zonta International convention in 2022 was to be held in Hamburg Germany. As this report is for the Archives, I believe it should be mentioned that COVID19, especially new strains, were still very much with us. Also with the Russian invasion of Ukraine taking place, our members cancelled their plans to travel to Hamburg for the 2022 convention.

The 66th Zonta International Convention in 2024 will be held in Brisbane, Australia so hopefully we can look forward with D23 to welcoming many Zontians down under.

Our "Club History in Brief" is included below in this Annual Report.

A Brief History of Zonta Club Adelaide Flinders 1981 -



The Zonta Club of Adelaide Flinders was chartered on 2 December 1981, with the support of the late Dr Heide Taylor from the Zonta Club of Adelaide. In December 2021 we celebrated our 40th birthday at a luncheon which celebrated the many years of service given to the community by the club. It was wonderful to see many past members including our past honorary member Ms Liz Scare and her husband as well as out Charter President Esme Proudman. Esme and the current


president Lesley Siegloff join hands over a large knife to cut the cake.

At that time we were part of District 16, which covered all of Australia and New Zealand. The District was split into two at the Auckland Conference in 1989 with New Zealand remaining as District 16. Australia then became District 23 – later separating into Districts 22, 23 and 24.

Within our District, which covers WA, SA, NT, Vic, Tas, we are one of 12 clubs in Area 2, which covers South Australia and Northern Territory.

Our Charter was presented by Mrs Leneen Ford who was at that time the District 16 Governor, at the newly-opened Hilton Hotel in Adelaide on 26th November 1982. The club had 35 Charter members. Charter President: Esme Proudman, First Vice President: Paddi Lowry, Second Vice Chairman: Trudy Pohl, Treasurer: Liz Versteeg, and Secretary: Barbara Gepp

Meetings: Held on the 3rd Wednesday of each month. Meetings began at The Public Schools Club, and then moved to Ayers House for over 20 years, and then in 2010 we moved back to our original home, the Public Schools Club. In 2019 we moved to our current location of the West Adelaide Football Club. This year there were a number of constraints to holding face to face



meetings especially Board meetings so Board meetings were generally held via Zoom. Unfortunately because of restrictions placed on us by government related to the Covid 19 pandemic we were unable to run our Amelia Earhart fundraising meeting in January, as a result the club decided to make a donation to the Foundation.

Club Board and Committees: For most of its history the Club Board has comprised: President, Vice President, Treasurer, Secretary and four or five Directors. Whilst it is preferable for Directors to chair a committee, this is not always possible.

Past Presidents: Charter President Esme Proudman (1981-1984), Jill Welsh (1984-1986), Gwenda Cunningham (1986-1988), Elizabeth Smith (deceased) (1988-1990), Shirley Stagg (1990-1992), Dr Sarah Cunningham (1992-1994), Marjorie Smith (deceased) OAM (1994-1996), Patricia Russell (deceased) (1996-1998), Fay Leditschke (1998-2000), Heather Sutton (2000-2002), Dr Pauline Glover (2002-2004), Isobel McFarlane (2004-2006) Cintra Amos (2006-2008), Carolyn Colquhoun (2008-2010); Jodi Knoop (2010-2012), Anne Miller (2012-2014), Sue Lear (2014-2016), Eronwy Edwards (2016-2018), Dr Heather Smigiel (2018-2020) and Dr Lesley Siegloff (2020-2022).

Our Club has had two Honorary Members – Jennifer Cashmore MP and Ms Liz Scarce, wife of former SA Governor, Rear Admiral Mr Kevin Scarce.

Membership: Membership peaked at 48 in 1991 and fell as low as 18 in 2001. Numbers remain steady between 20 and 30 for some years; however we are now 30 members. Length of service is valued and rewarded with Club service badges being given for every 5 years of service. We are fortunate to have a wealth of knowledge within our club with half of the membership having over 20years, service and no less than 10 Past Presidents among our membership.

Fellowship is encouraged and is an integral part of our Club and members are congratulated for special occasions and supported whenever the need arises.

Advocacy Projects: Advocacy is an increasing priority for Zonta and we are active within our Combined Area Advocacy Committee. We support ACSO (Assoc. of Community Service Organisations SA) and are an active member of The National Council of Women - SA. A member of our club has been on the Adelaide White Ribbon Breakfast Committee since inception in 2008 and is now a member of the new White Ribbon Australia SA Committee. This year we became more engaged with our local Western Community joining the West Adelaide Domestic Violence Consortium which has representation from the West Torrens Council, Charles Sturt Council and the Port Adelaide, Enfield Council and organisations such as, Uniting care, Relationships Australia –SA and Zahra.

Service Projects: Service projects have addressed the Zonta priorities of health, education and economic self- sufficiency of women and girls.

In 2022 we strongly support the "Zonta Says No!" Campaign to "Stop Violence against Women". We currently support women's shelters with toiletry bags, and our Shoe Boxes of Love project. In the past we have supported a girls' vocational orphanage and learning centre in Cambodia, indigenous and migrant projects, scholarships for young women undertaking study or internships, and also the production of a video to provide information and treatment options to women diagnosed with breast cancer, which was translated into several languages. We have recently partnered with the Girl Guides Association and the Zahra Foundation to offer programs to support women and girls. Our club was one of only 2 within our district to win a grant from Zonta International to support a project whereby we partnered with another organisation, this was the beginning of our association with the Zahra Foundation, and the "Food for Thought" project began. The Zonta Rug Project which began in 2005 was a very successful hands-on project involving not only Zontians but the wider community and while this project is no longer a club project, many club members still participate and offer their service. We are active with all grant applications when they are offered and we have been successful on occasions. In recent years we have also been fortunate to receive two very generous donations from Mr. Wes Pickering in memory of his late wife Trish who died 10 years ago from Breast Cancer. Having received a Breast cushion just following her original surgery both Trish and Wes were very grateful and became interested in Zonta's work and philosophy. The funds donated will be used over the next few years to award 2 women per annum who have been an inspiration in supporting their community.

Fundraising Activities: The Club's major fundraiser, an annual movie night has been held for over 30 years. Other successful fundraisers include "A Taste of Zonta" recipe book which included contributions from members and celebrities Over the years, we have held numerous social fundraising dinners, lunches, fashion parades, art exhibitions, and high teas to name a few. In recent times a regular sausage sizzle has been added to our fundraising activities and something new, a garage sale. Members are continually thinking of ways in which to boost funds, both for Club and Service use. The Zonta Challenge and loose change purses to name two. An outcome of one of our successful service projects which was funded through the ZI Centenary Grants "Food

for Thought" was the production of a special recipe book. The books 2nd edition has been offered for sales at many events, the funds raised since printing costs have been recovered are included in our fundraising outcomes.

Area Activities: The Club has been represented at all Area Workshops since Charter and hosted many of these, and club members have served terms as Area 2 Director. The club will host the Area 2 Workshop in May this year as we see out this biennium.

District Involvement: The Club has always been well represented at District Conferences and has been represented on the District 23 Board with Margaret Rowland serving as Governor, Lt Governor and Area Director 1994-2000.Cintra Amos served as Area 2 Director and Lt. Governor 2008- 2012.Carolyn Colquhoun served as D23 Treasurer 2010-2012. Cintra Amos was the chair of the 2015 District 23 Conference Committee. and was District Service Chair (2016-2018).Sue Lear was District Chair of Young Women in Public Affairs (2016-2018), and Margaret Rowland was appointed Chair of the District 23 Centenary Anniversary Celebration Committee (2018-2020). Past President Eronwy Edwards served on the District Board as Area 2 Director (2018-2020)and was D23 Foundation Ambassador (202-2022).

<u>Past members</u>: Dr Pauline Glover served as Area 2 Director and Lt Governor 2004-2008 and chaired the District Advocacy Committee 2010-2014, and Anne Miller served as Vice Area 2 Director (2014-2016).

District Projects: The Club has strongly supported all District 23 projects including Breast Cushions which are made and offered to all women in hospitals undergoing breast surgery, and Birthing Kits which are packed and sent to third world countries so that women can have clean birthing conditions.

International Activities: The Club has been represented at most International Conventions since Charter, with no less than 7 club members attending the Japan Convention in June 2018. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic and the airlines being grounded, the Zonta International Convention in 2020 which was to be held in Chicago, was cancelled. This year 2022 the convention is to be held in Hamburg, Germany, however due to Russia invading Ukraine our members cancelled their plans to travel to Europe. In 2024 Brisbane, Australia is to host the Convention and we look forward with D23 to welcoming Zontians down under.

Zonta International Foundation for Women: Each year the Club contributes 1/3 of funds raised to the Zonta International Foundation. Some members make individual donations, and the Club makes donations in the name of members on special occasions.
